41 Cook Elementary School Park

Located adjacent to Cook Elementary School on Perrine Rd. off of N. Saginaw Rd.

Cook Elementary School Park was recently renovated in a joint effort between the City of Midland, the Cook School PTO, and Midland Public Schools. It has the latest style of play equipment and plenty of it. It also has two paved basketball courts, a softball field, a soccer field and play fields. While the park is loved by school children, it is open for all to enjoy.



42 Glencoe Park

Located on Gibson St. off Sturgeon Rd., 1/4 mile north of Saginaw Rd.

This small, 1.6-acre park is a great place for neighborhood children to play and parents to relax. It offers play equipment, a sandbox, a picnic table and a basketball hoop.

43 Huron Park

Located between Huntington Dr. and Hedgewood Dr. off Saginaw Rd.

Huron Park is 25.9-acres of undeveloped forest. Lying among neighborhood homes, Huron is full of nature trails amid a variety of deciduous trees. It is a great place to go on a peaceful hike and to observe local wildlife and vegetation.

44 Lalkwood Park

Located on Lalkwood Dr. off Schade Dr. just south of Wackerly Rd.

People looking for a place to play catch, fly a kite, or just run around will love the open area of Lalkwood Park. Located between neighborhood houses, this park is 2.3 acres of treeless, open fields.

45 Mac Park

Located at the end of Mac Ct. off Saginaw Rd. just east of Eastman Ave.

Mac Park is a 1.2-acre undeveloped area full of enormous pine trees. This simple, isolated park can provide refuge to those in the busy area of Eastman Ave. and Saginaw Rd.

46 Northwest Park

Located on Sturgeon Ave. 1/4 mile north of Airport Rd. and U.S.-10.

Northwest Park has recently been converted to a top notch Little League complex, home of Midland's Northwest Little League.

The three new fields have all the best features for players. The fields come complete with dugouts, electronic scoreboards, and even bleachers for the fans.



47 Russell Park

Located on Sylvan Ln. 1/2 mile east of Eastman Ave.

Russell Park is a 9-acre open area that draws neighborhood children with its unique wooden pirate ship. Older kids may enjoy using the soccer goal, complete with net and plenty of open space. Additionally, swings are available at this location.

48 Siebert Park

Located north of Siebert Elementary on Siebert St.

Siebert Park is a 12-acre undeveloped area. Covered in dense woods, this is a great place to view Midland wildlife. The forest also contains marked paths, where nature enthusiasts love to hike year round.

49 St. Mary's Park

Located at the corner of St. Mary's Dr. and Drake St. 1/4 mile north of Saginaw Rd.

St. Mary's is a 5.9-acre park nestled in a quiet neighborhood. The majority of the park is open play fields, dotted sporadically with pine trees. There are also swings located at the west end of the park.

50 Sturgeon Creek Park

Located along Sturgeon Creek Pkwy. 1/4 mile north of Saginaw Rd.

Sturgeon Creek Park comprises 25.2-acres on the banks of Sturgeon Creek. Sunk below the neighboring streets and houses, this undeveloped area is peaceful and private. Visitors may be lucky enough to catch a glimpse of the wildlife living among the fallen trees.

51 City Forest

City Forest is located on Monroe Rd. 1/4 mile west of Eastman Ave.



City Forest comprises 520 acres of hardwoods and pines and is perfect for outdoor activities year-round.

During the winter, City Forest is best known for its four iced toboggan runs. They provide visitors with a unique, exciting experience. There is also a large sled hill available for public use. The hill is lit for night use, and snowmaking equipment keeps it in great condition. The forest also provides 11 kilometers of groomed trails perfect for cross country skiing or snowshoeing. Trails range from beginner to advanced. Visitors can complete their winter trip to the forest with a skate on the ice rink and a cup of hot chocolate in the chalet.

Once the snow melts, the fun doesn't stop at City Forest. The chalet becomes available for rental from April 15th through November 15th. The forest itself becomes a popular area for nature lovers. The miles of marked trails are a great place for a nature hike or jog. Also, in conjunction with the Michigan Mountain Biking Association, the City has developed eight miles of mountain biking trails. With plenty of steep hills, twists and turns, these trails will provide an exciting ride to even experienced riders.
